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# Short Description



In the period of March 26 - 28, 2021, the Youth Initiative for Human Rights Croatia and the Youth Initiative for Human Rights Serbia with the support of the Government of the United Kingdom and the United Nations Development Program (UNDP) organized the School of Transitional Justice via Zoom for participants from Serbia and Croatia. The school was conducted in the B/C/S languages.

Aware of the responsibility we hold as a civil society organization, we created this school to offer the young people from Croatia and Serbia the knowledge and open space to discuss the topics that divide our societies. The generations born after the war deserve a chance to build solidarity and a better-quality life in countries once at war. The conditions for such development include a critical approach to the past and an honest desire for tolerance and reconciliation. This school is one way to contribute to the construction of better, more honest, and more stable neighborly relations.



# The Foundations of Transitional Justice

# **Marijana Toma**UNDP consultant

A lecture about the origins of transitional justice as a concept, its goals, and mechanisms, such as criminal justice, truth commissions, reparations, and institutional reform based on the examples of Latin American countries, Rwanda, Spain, and Canada.

A lecture about the work and the legacy of the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY) and the current work of the International Residual Mechanism for Criminal Tribunals (IRMCT). The lecture focused on explaining the importance of achieving criminal justice as part of transitional justice mechanisms.



### Memorialization

#### Jelena Đureinović

historian and coordinator of the research platform "Transformations and Eastern Europe" at the University of Vienna

A lecture about memorialization highlighting its role in preventing the repetition of crimes and discussing the ways in which memory activism opposes historical revisionism and denial.





## The Politics of Memory

# **Nevena Škrbić Alempijević** professor at the Faculty of humanities and social sciences, University of Zagreb

Can memory be societal? How is it transferred? What is the relationship between the politics of memory and the culture of memory? Why do societies forget? What is the relationship between individual and collective memory? The lecture about the politics of memory touched upon these and many other questions.

The school of transitional justice proved to be
a successful platform for the development of critical thinking,
the culture of dialogue, and democratic values,
such as sensibility for difference, tolerance, and solidarity.
Relying upon different disciplines and professions,
the organizers of the school pointed out the importance
of dealing with the past as a mechanism for social conflict resolution
in a very applied and well-argued way.
The great turnout of interested participants
and their active participation in constructive discussions
pointed out the social relevance and need for such programs.

### Narratives in History Textbooks

#### Nikica Torbica

DKolektiv – organization for social development

A lecture about the material and symbolic reparations as well as the concept of civil war victims studied through examples of reparations in Croatia, Serbia, and Bosnia and Herzegovina.



# Sexual Violence in Conflict

A lecture about the feminist definition of sexual violence in conflict and its recognition in international conventions and laws as a crime against humanity in the ICTY judgments, and the relationship between war rape and crimes against humanity. We also focused on the establishment ant and the work of the Women's Courts.





## Dealing with the Past through Art Forms

#### **Jasmila Žbanić** director

A conversation about the motivation and the process of creating the movie "Quo vadis, Aida?", a movie nominated for an Oscar for the best foreign feature film in 2020 and the first feature film about the genocide in Srebrenica. During the conversation which was open to the public, we spoke about the approach of individuals, societies, and institutions towards the consequences of the wars of the 1990s, the burden of the past for the present and future generations in the post-Yugoslav space, as well as the opportunities and the impact of artistic expressions in the fight against historical revisionism and the exercise of the right to truth.

# Methodology and Applications

### Methodology

The methodological approach of the school included familiarizing the participants with the theoretical frameworks related to transitional justice as well as interactive participation in discussions on this topic. The participants commented on this methodological approach:

We actively participated in the reflections with the lecturer, which further helped us better understand the topic.

An excellent lecturer who helped us approach the topic through clear examples and enabled us to discuss the material in small groups.

The introductory part was particularly interesting when we participated through the online application.

The discussions were very substantial, and I would particularly highlight how everyone who wanted to say something could do so at every moment, and everyone's points of view were considered and respected.

### **Applications**

55 young people (18 – 30 years old) from Croatia and Serbia applied to the school, and 30 of them participated.
